History of Parkview

Parkview Community Foundation began in 1994 in the home of Gwendolyn Brown-Johnson as a means to help neighborhood children who were coming home from school to empty houses, and usually to no evening meal. Gwen opened her home to children after school to provide them a safe environment, helped them with homework and provided them supper. As the number of at-risk children served grew, Gwen moved the operation to an abandoned house nearby.

Parkview Community Foundation was incorporated as a North Carolina non-profit in 1997, and recognized by the IRS in 1998 as a 501(c)(3) organization, confirmed by the IRS in 2002.

Parkview moved into its current location at 1105 Pryor Street in August, 2004. Gwen has been the Executive Director of Parkview since its inception.



Kid's Cafe'

We feed any child FREE! Monday - Friday between 3PM to 5PM.

Backpack Program

A backpack full of nutritious, ready-to-eat and easy to prepare foods is sent home on weekends and holidays when school and Kid's Cafe' are not available.

Food Distribution

In partnership with Second Harvest Food Bank and other area businesses, approximately sixty (60) needy neighborhood children are serviced daily.

Many meals are provided through food donations from local restaurants and businesses.

Parkview's Mission

To help the children of the area reach their individual full potential and to be prepared for adult life and adulthood.

To provide the children and youth with a program that is neighborhood centered, places a high priority on the entire family's economic and social well being, and based on a foundation of positive core values.

To provide an environment that is (1) safe, (2) enriching, (3) supportive of good health habits, and (4) nurturing and filled with hope and encouragement.

Parkview Community

The Parkview Community Foundation is located on the west side of Charlotte near Freedom Drive. As parents of the Parkview children face high rates of addiction and incarceration, grandparents often raise a significant number of children. Many children are unsupervised after school, well into the night and at other times when school is not in session.

Neglect is common among the children of Parkview. We are committed to the enrichment of the lives of our children. Parkview offers a structured environment that fosters respect for rules and other people. Due to space restrictions, up to thirty-five children come to the Parkview Center every day from the time they get out of school, starting at 3:00 pm, and they stay until 5:30 pm or later.

Summer Day Camp

Parkview offers a five-week summer camping program that provides three meals a day, a reading program, two field trips a week, and a variety of enriching activities. Vacation Bible School is offered for those who want to attend.

A waiting list is not uncommon.

Tutoring & Afterschool

Parkview offers a a structured schedule that includes:

- * A pro-homework atmosphere and support.
- Adult staff and volunteers who assist with tutoring, meals, activities and discipline.
- Computer assisted learning in literacy and math using donated computers and software.
- * An effective program of discipline and reward that encourages good behavior.
- * A computer lab is available for those who do not own a computer with qualified volunteers on duty to answer any questions.
- Children are offered the opportunity to attend a weekly Bible study.
